How is A-Level History structured?

Unit 1 - Y105 - 25% - Wars of the Roses: Yorkists, Lancastrians and Henry VII, 1445-1509.

Unit 2 - Y218 - 15% - International Relations, 1885-1941 - Causes of WW1, peace-keeping in the Interwar Years, Rise of Fascism, Imperial Japan

Unit 3 - Y319 - 40% - Thematic Study: Civil Rights, 1865-1992 - Native Americans, Women, Trade Unions and Civil Rights.

Unit 4 - Y100 - 20% - Coursework: Women's suffrage/Russian Revolution/Rise of Fascism/Wars of the Roses/International Relations - 4000 word essay.

What skills will you need in A-Level History?

Unit 1: Analysis of 4 source, knowledge essay

Unit 2: 2 essays based on knowledge

Unit 3: Analysis of 2 interpretations, 2 essays looking at continuity and change across the time period

Unit 4: 4000 word essay combining knowledge, sources and interpretations.

What does A Level History involve?

- Variety of tasks in lessons reading, discussions, tables, timelines, videos and more.
- Reading sources and interpretations.
- Extended writing every fortnight essays and practice answers.
- Regular homework reading, research and writing.
- Extending your knowledge reading articles, books, watching documentaries and films.
- Coursework independent research (internet, books, sources, interpretations) to write a 4000 word essay.

Transferable skills - reading and drawing out key details, identifying fact and fiction, writing to give judgements and opinions, justifying opinions. Also you learn about people, cultures and societies.





What were the Wars of the Roses?

The civil struggle between the royal house of Lancaster, whose emblem was a red rose, and the royal house of York, whose emblem was a white rose, beginning in 1455 and ending with the accession of Henry VII in 1485 and the union of the two houses.
